BATTERING RAMS



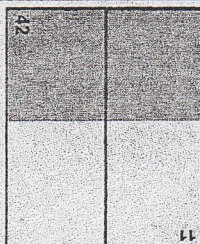
Northwest of Danzig Germany, 6 May 1945: The troops fighting on the split of land called the Frische Nehrung were squeezed together more and more. Only Nickelswalde and Schiefenhurst were still in German hands. Feverish efforts were underway there to evacuate women and children to the west by boat. Wherever the tanks went there were civilians tattered and exhausted a cargo of misery and tears. The soldiers no longer had weapons built loading ramps and helped the civilians. But there were still 180,000 people on the Frische Nehrung and it would take a long time to get them all away. It was the job of Oberfeldwebel Hermann Bix and his Jagdpanthers to enable this giant escape action to succeed by defending the surrounding area. There, where the Russians were trying to breakthrough, were the tanks of the 4th Panzer Division, on the beach along the bay, in the dunes of the Danzig Bight. In the morning light of the May 6, 1945, Oberfeldwebel Bix saw through his binoculars the muzzle brake of a giant gun belonging to a Russian behemoth come crashing out of the trees in front of him. Momentarily astonished by its size he gave the order to "Load armour-piercing" and "Range 400 metres, Fire!" The area surrounding his camouflaged Tank Destroyer was now shrouded in fumes and smoke giving his position away. Bix watched in amazement as each of the three 8.8cm armour-piercing shell, that struck lumbering behemoth appeared to have no effect. Suddenly the ground in front of Bix's Jagdpanther exploded forcing them inside for cover. Another pair of behemoths appeared from the buildings to the north of his position. The Russians were now using their "Battering Rams" to force their way through the German blocking positions. Bix's Jagdpanther rocked backwards and he felt the blow the Russian shell impact upon his front hull knocking his gun off its trunnion making it inoperative. Bix order his driver to "Back Up!" withdrawing out of sight, and then radioed a warning to the Jagdpanthers belonging to Feldwebel Hofknecht and just arriving Leutnant Pintelmann to be careful. Hofknecht acknowledge the warning just as one of the behemoth moved across his hidden position broadside. When fully in his sight Hofknecht let loose two AP rounds into its side then watch the vehicle grind to a halt. He noted the three shot fired from Bix's cannon had struck the centre of the bow of the behemoth and penetrated 10cm. They had been unable to pierce the 20cm thick sloped frontal armour. Pintelmann was less fortunate, as he pulled into position his tank destroyer was struck in the mantle and disabled. He was forced to withdraw. The Russians behemoths stopped suddenly, turned and withdrew. Oberfeldwebel Bix later received orders to withdraw towards Nickelswalde. On the way he heard from civilians that Germany had already surrendered.

TIGERS TO THE FRONT



North of Smerdyna, Russia 11 February 1943: The morning of 10 February 1943 dawned. It was still not yet light when the Russian artillery fire began to fall on the German positions near Krasny Bor and north of Smerdyna. The Soviets launched a pincer attack from the area south of the Pogostye pocket in the east and the Kolpino-Krasny Bor area in the west in an effort to capture Mga and the Kirov rail-line. The Russians penetrated three kilometres into the German lines. They captured Krasny Bor, but were halted at the Ishora River. The Spanish "Blue Division's" Fusilier Battalion lost 90 percent of its effectiveness. Nevertheless it held on until a counterattack by the 212th Infantry Division under Generalmajor Reyman threw back the Soviet forces. The 11 February 1943 the 1st Company 502nd Heavy Panzer Battalion launched a counterattack with the 27th Freiwilligen "Flemish Legion" Grenadier Division. The small force of Tigers, whose mission was to drive the Soviets out of the former positions of the "Blue Division", moved off again. Suddenly enemy tanks appeared and within a few seconds Oberfeldwebel Hans Bolter counted ten, approaching from the snow covered wood to the right. The shells fired by the Tigers smashed into the wave of attacking Soviet tanks in rapid succession. The Battle lasted for hours. Russian troops charged the Tigers, and were driven off by the escorting infantry. The "Flemish Legion" stormed after the tanks, reaching the former main line of resistance and drove out the Russians in close quarter fighting.

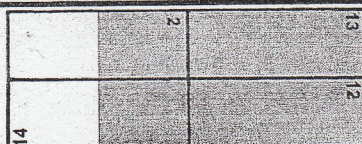
Deilinghofen Airfield RUHR POCKET GERMANY, 12 April 1945: By 1 April when the pincers around the Ruhr Pocket snapped shut. The US 9th Army already had one corps engaged in reducing the pocket. The American First Army led by the 17th Airborne Corps pushed north closing the pocket from the south. During these first few days, the Germans defended in some almost every town, village and most ridge and streamline. The Germans launched several counter attacks, but each encountered strong American resistance. The result being that they were being pushed back four to six miles each day. By the 11 April the Germans where seldom defending ridges or wooded areas, resistance centred only in towns and villages along the main roads. In the last days of the Pocket, opposition usually centred around a roadblock covered by infantry supported either by a few tanks and assault guns or by AA guns. The 11 April 1945 Hauptmann Albert Ernst receive what would to be his last orders from LIII Panzer Korps. Kampfgruppe Ernst was to hold the Deilinghofen Airfield for 24-hours. Ernst set up his command post in the near by Iserlohn and deployed his forces around the airfield. Late in the afternoon, the Americans felt towards Iserlohn. An advance guard was pushing to capture the last remaining useable airfield in the Ruhr Pocket. Kampfgruppe Ernst continued to hold out as the Americans probed their defence. Even as the last plane took off with it's high ranking officers known as "Golden Pheasants", the Jagdtigers's resolute in the defence of Iserlohn, determined the matter in which Hauptmann Ernst was to surrender his forces and bringing to the end Jagdtiger Abteilung 512.

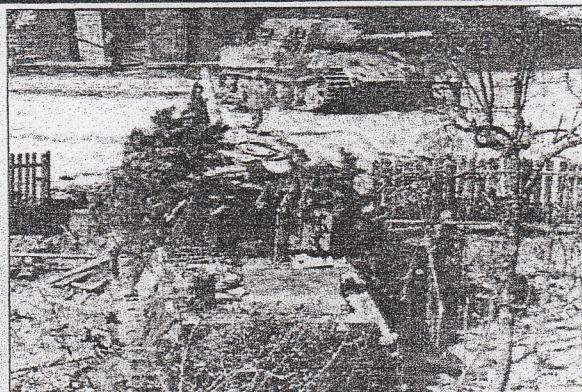

PANZERS FORWARD!



GUISE, FRANCE 17 MAY 1940: By the evening of 15 May, advance elements of Reinhardt's 6th Panzer Division had more than made up for three days' waiting at the Meuse; they were farther west than any other German units, having raced a record-breaking 40 miles in one day, something few units could achieve in a peacetime exercise. Now they were to encounter one of the most formidable units that the French Army had in the field. The men of France's 2nd Armoured Division had also endured three anxious days. Its tanks had been loaded on to trains and separated from the division's wheeled elements. On the morning of 14 May the divisional commander, General A.C. Bruché had admitted he was not sure where all the different components of his division were. A change of orders on 15 May placed the division under a new army commander and ordered to Signy-l'Abbaye. To join it, the tanks would have to make their own way from the railway station at Hirson. It was the fate of the French 2nd Armoured Division that Reinhardt's 6th Panzer Division was heading for Signy too. The Germans blundered right through the middle of the division and by the morning of 16 May the 2nd Armoured Division was split in two and scattered across the countryside, lacking divisional HQ communication without a High Command and any supplies. The attack on Guise began at first light on 17 May. As the panzers of Oberleutnant Dr. Bäke rumbled forward the French heavy tanks opened fire from positions at the edge of the town. The dismounted motorcycle troops worked their way forward from cover to cover. The few still operational anti-tank guns fired on the enemy tanks, whose muzzle flashes betrayed their positions. "Panzers Forward, maximum speed!" called Bäke. The tanks rumbled forward until they came upon an anti-tank gun position, overrunning it in the process. The German motorcycle troops had fought their past the French positions at the edge of town and were now engaged in house-to-house fighting in Guise. The French surrender to Oberleutnant Dr. Bäke, whose company had achieved its first major success of the French campaign, destroying or putting out of action three heavy tanks, four anti-tank guns, a large number of trucks and captured the bridges at Hautville and Marquigny intact.

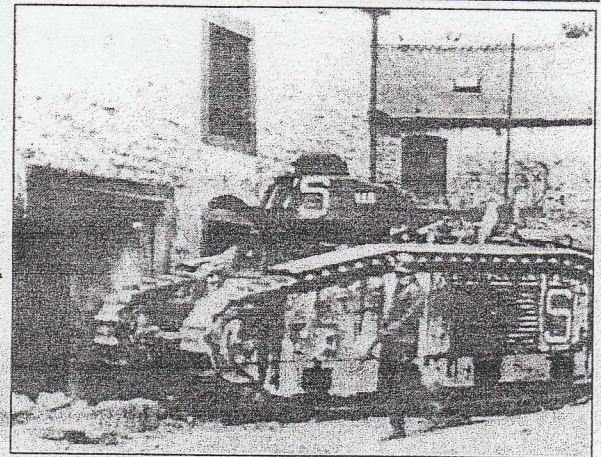

PARRY AND STRIKE



West of the Letila Heights, Russia 29 October 1944: The first Battle of Courland began just before first light on 27 October 1944 with Soviet artillery bombardment. Two thousand guns of all calibre opened fire along the entire front between Prekult and the Venta. A little later, under the protection of this mighty barrage, which shifted slowly to the north, Soviet tank and infantry brigades went to the attack. The main blow was directed against the German 30th Infantry Division, but soon the 4th and 14th Panzer Divisions were also under attack. The next day the Russian achieved a penetration into the German main line of resistance and the grenadiers were pushed out of their position. By the 29 October the Russians had advanced across the Priezukrogs-Dzezgaleskrogs road and were storming northwards. They were met by Oberfeldwebel Herman Bix freshly arrived from hospital in Germany by train where he received the Wound Badge in Silver and the Panzer Assault Badge, Second Grade. Herman Bix's and his platoon of Panthers engaged the T-34's and super-heavy Stalin tanks of the surging Russian armoured formations in and around the deep-forested ravines of the Letila Heights. The battle continued for two days before the Russian spearheads were halted. Bix then received orders to counterattack with the 108th Grenadier Regiment to retake the Letila Heights. Bix assembled his platoon and rumbled off towards the heights, it was not long before they made contact with the mixed T-34s and Stalins tank of the Soviets which attempted to parry the German counterattack. Herman Bix pressed forward the attack and weighed into the battle. His Panther was struck several times ripping armoured skirts and storage bins off but was unable to penetrate the Panther's thick armour. In this deadly duel Herman Bix and his crew had lost little from their convalescing time in Germany, and in within the first few minutes he bagged himself a pair of T-34s and a Stalin. Bix then manoeuvred his Panther to intervene when a wave of Russian armour seemed to overrun the grenadiers. He knocked out another pair of T-34s and a Stalin, and forced the remainder to withdraw. The battle came to an end. Oberfeldwebel Bix had destroyed eight tanks, his Panther had also been hit, but apart from the damage to the track, he had been lucky. When evening came the Soviets called off their attack, because the majority of their tanks were now lying shot up, burning and smouldering on the battlefield. Herman Bix and his crew were at the end of their strength. They crawled from their tank and threw themselves onto to piles of straw in one peasant hut. Tomorrow would be another day.

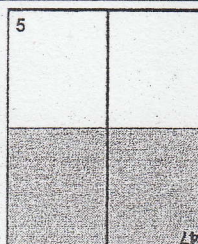

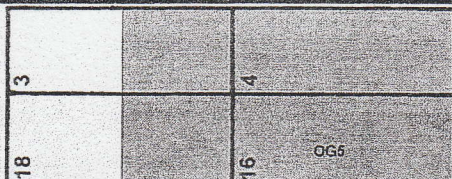

TIGER OF VITEBSK



East of VITEBSK, RUSSIA 19 December 1943: The Russians concentrated 37 Rifle, and 3 Cavalry Divisions in the Vitebsk area, and reinforced them with an additional 15 armoured divisions and 4 mechanized brigades. The Vitebsk area had become the hot spot of the Eastern Front. Feldmarschall Busch, the commander of Army Group Centre, appealed to the other three armies of his army group to voluntarily send whatever forces they could spare to the threatened Third Panzer Army. Only thus could a disaster be averted. Detraining just before dawn, the much-feared 8.8cm armed Hornisse of the 2nd Platoon, Kompanie 1, sPzJg 512, under the command of Leutnant Albert Ernst arrived outside of the village strongpoint east of Vitebsk. The Russian Winter Offensive found the sPzJg. Abteilung 519 in a familiar role of fire brigade. Their job was to shore up the thin German line in front of the western bound Soviet juggernaut. As the light began to fade in the December late afternoon the three Hornisses moved into hull-down positions overlooking the dug-in infantry company at the edge of the Russian village. Then the thunder and crash of artillery pounded the trench line, as the Russian guns zeroed in on the German Infantry Company. Then hundreds of dark silhouettes lifted from the snow and began to charge towards the trench system. Behind the infantry Albert Ernst spotted several dark box shape objects rapidly moving forward. He quickly identified them as T34's and KV's, and allowed them to move into better ground before giving the order to fire. The trio of Tank Destroyers fired as one and the first shells left the long barrels of the eighty-eights, rocking the tank destroyers backwards from their recoil. Flames erupted from the stricken T34s, abruptly the entire phalanx of the attacking tanks stopped. The three Hornisses with their long-barrelled eighty-eights continued to pour fire into the attacking Soviet tanks. More and more of them lay stricken and burning or turned and drove back into the protective darkness of the forest. In the snow-covered fields lie eight smoking hulks, six by Ernst and one each by the other two tank destroyers crews. The Russian infantry had also pulled back, disappearing into the darkness. The break through would not happen here.
