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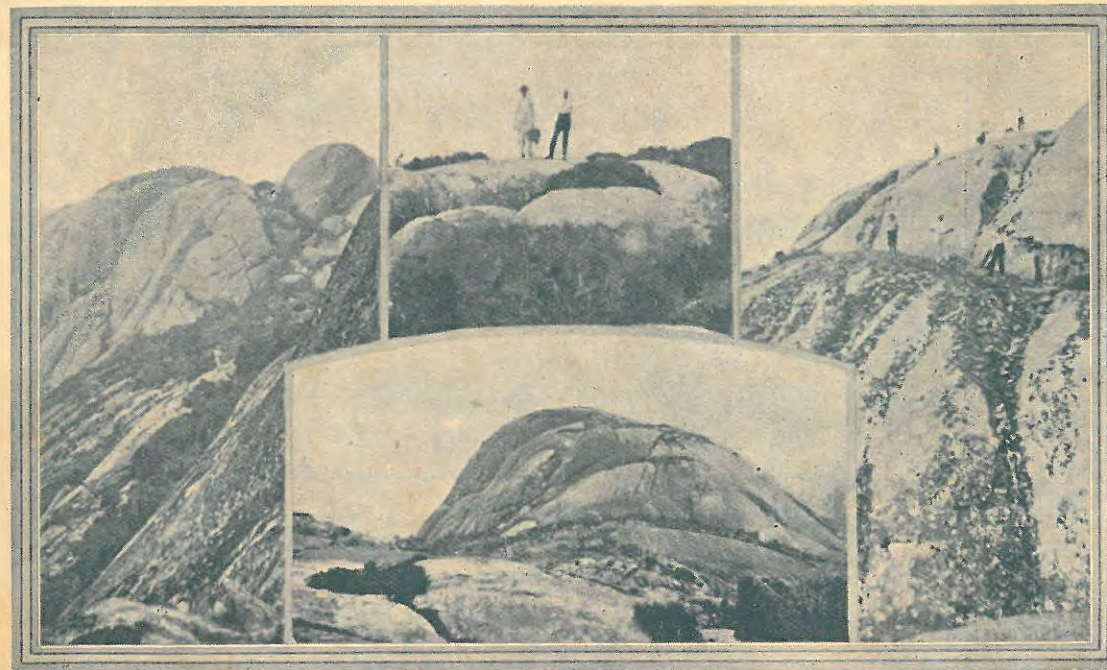
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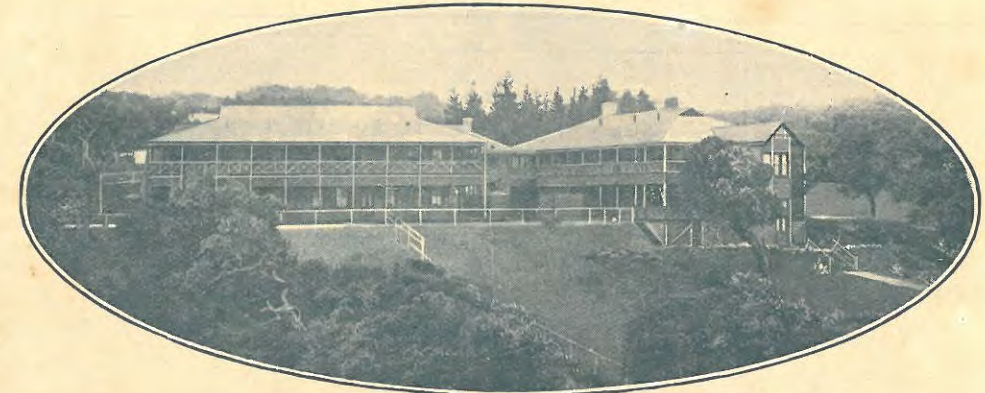


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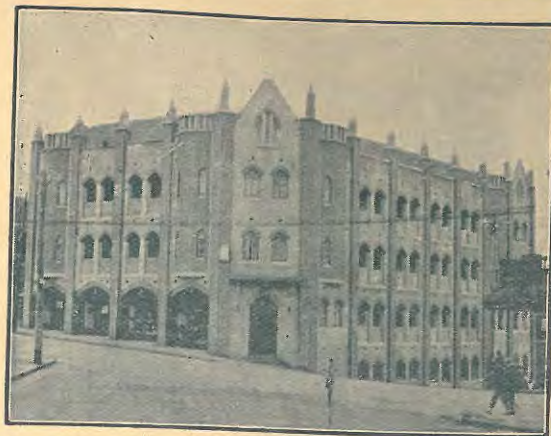
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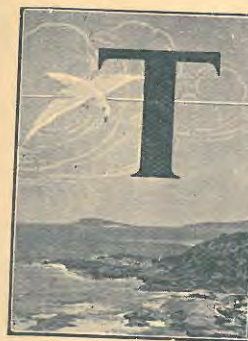
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## INTRODUCTION

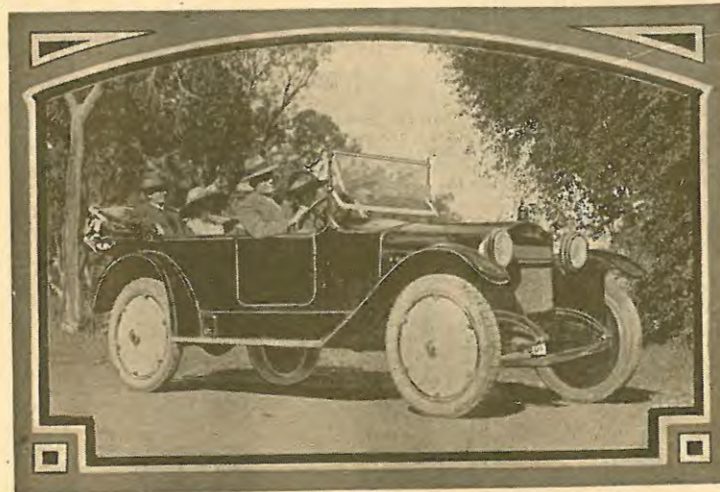

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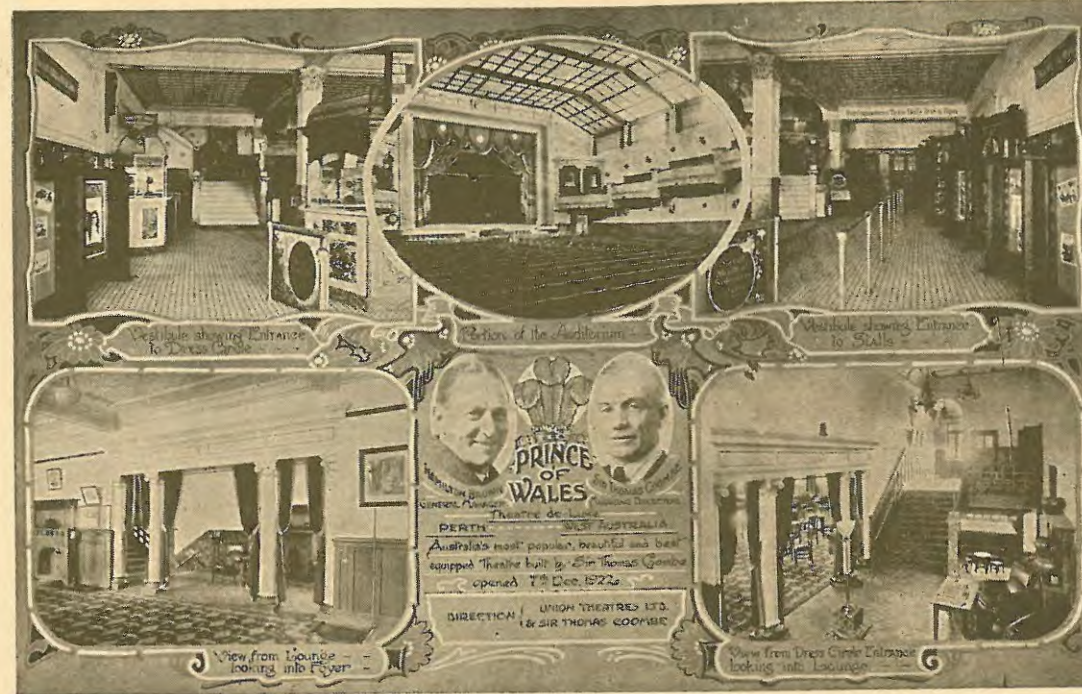


## THEATRES, PICTURE PALACES, ETC.

Western Australia, like other States of the Commonwealth, has been well provided with popular places of amusement. In the capital there are five theatres—The Prince of Wales, The Luxor, His Majesty's, The Royal, and The Unity—and quite a number of picture palaces. The appointments in all of them are of an elaborate description, and every comfort and convenience are provided for patrons. The Prince of Wales is a recent addition to the list of theatres, and in its interior arrangements is one of the most up-to-date within the Commonwealth. The interior furnishings, which have been carried out in a most artistic manner, are completed almost entirely with West Australian woods, and strikingly display their suitability for work of this nature. The Luxor is the home of vaudeville, which always attracts large audiences. During the summer open-air picture shows are conducted in each of the suburbs.

Fremantle is also well provided with picture palaces, and the same may be said of the other towns within the Metropolitan Area.

In many of the country towns there is a permanent picture palace, and where no such building exists, pictures are screened at regular intervals in local halls. During the greater part of the year, also, touring theatricals visit most of the country centres.





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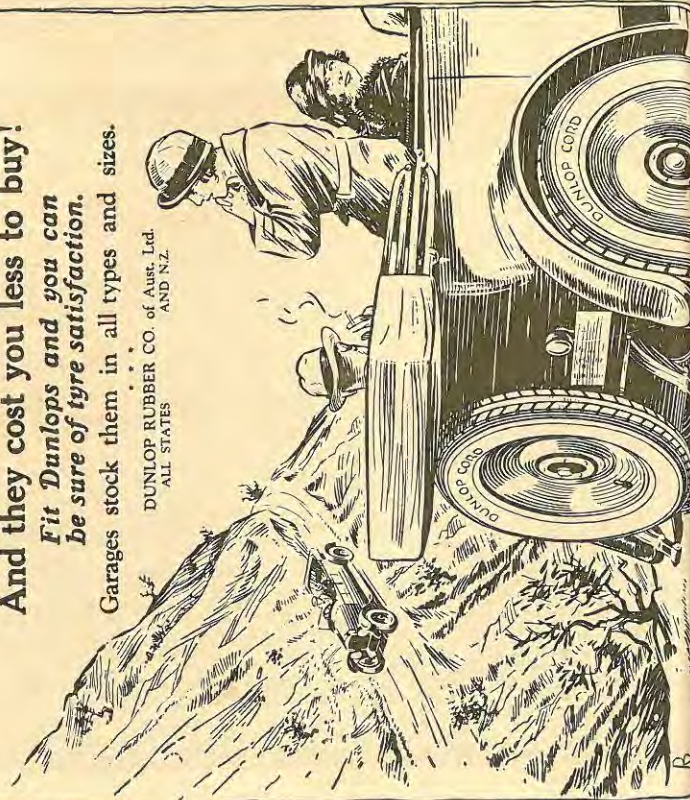
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## Perth, Fremantle, and the Metropolitan Area.

### PERTH.

Perth, the capital, dates from 1829. For the first fifty years its existence its progress, although steady, was slow. As originally planned, the city had an area of 3,575 acres, but at the present time, through the inclusion of suburban municipalities certain other areas, there are now 14,343 acres within the boundaries of Greater Perth. In 1871 the population of the city and suburbs was only 4,500, by 1894 it had risen to 15,700, the metropolitan area now contains 177,000 people. Those in 1829 selected the site for the capital of the new colony of Western Australia were happily inspired. They chose a spot with many of the natural features which are essential for the comfortable accommodation of large numbers of people. The southern boundary of the city is the Swan River, and no capital city in Australia has at its front door a river that, for its beauty, can even remotely compare with the Swan. The total length of the streets of Greater Perth is over 248 miles. The electric tramways have a route track over 27 miles in length. The capital value of Greater Perth, including buildings, is £20,047,939. The Annual Revenue is £278,000. Greater Perth consists of five wards, viz., Central, East, West, and the suburbs of Leederville and Victoria Park. The suburbs of South Perth, on the south side of the river, and Subiaco, which adjoins West Ward, are self-governed.

Perth is particularly well dowered with public parks and open spaces. King's Park, with an area of over 1,000 acres, is one of the finest, and is certainly the most picturesque in Australia. Part of its southern edge, overlooking the river, is high and precipitous, rising in parts to over 250 feet. From this vantage ground magnificent views to the South and East may be obtained. Southward is South Perth and the estuary of the Swan River, with vistas of rich undulating country stretching to the horizon. Eastward the prospect includes Belmont and the areas on which Guildford and Midland Junction stand, and the view is bounded by the Darling Range, veiled in a light haze. The greater part of the Park is still in a natural state and covered with various native timbers. Here and there are seen the partially filled-in sawpits at which, in the early days, were broken down the big trees whose timber went to

the building of early Perth, and within the city boundaries there are 50 parks, reserves, and recreation grounds, and these, including city endowment lands, have a total area of 5,653 acres. Opposite the Post Office in St. George's Terrace are the Government Gardens, which, although not of great extent, are of great beauty and contain a number of attractive exotics. The Queen's Gardens at the East end of Hay Street will repay a visit. These contain a number of pretty lakelets in which aquatic plants form a prominent feature. Hyde Park also contains a picturesque lake which is the habitat of numerous wildfowl and imported waterfowl. It is the favourite resort of numbers of citizens and their children.

Perth possesses many fine public buildings and institutions. Among these may be mentioned the Treasury Public Offices in St. George's Terrace, with the Town Hall on the Hay Street frontage of the block. The Town Hall was opened in 1870, and is a unique city ornament. At the corner of Beaufort and James Streets are the Public Library and Museum, both noble buildings, and housing many treasures in Art and Literature. The new Post Office, facing Forrest Place, between Wellington and Murray Streets, opposite the Central Railway Station, is undoubtedly the finest in Australia. In St. George's Terrace there are also many fine edifices, including St. George's House, the A.M.P. Building, and Emanuel Buildings. Here too are the banks and the offices of insurance and many other companies.

Time was when the river lapped the allotments on the Esplanade and Bazaar Terrace, but a good deal of reclamation work has been done along the frontage, and to date over 100 acres have been added to the city's recreation spaces. On the reclaimed land are bowling greens and tennis courts, and football and cricket and other games are now played where once the river flowed. At the Barrack Square, on the river edge of the reclaimed ground, are the jetties from which ferry and river steamers start. And here, too, are the club-houses of a number of yachting and boating clubs.

Perth is encircled by well laid-out suburbs. On the South side of the River is South Perth, which can be reached from the City by ferry boat or tramway. It contains the Zoological Gardens, a favourite holiday resort of citizens and visitors. At the Zoo

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natural hot baths, which are used with highly beneficial results by sufferers from rheumatism. On the North are Mt. Lawley, Inglewood, and North Perth, all of them residential suburbs, on the West are Leederville and Subiaco. The line of railway from Perth to Fremantle is dotted with other suburbs, including Belmont, Swanbourne, Cottesloe, and Cottesloe Beach.

The river has many attractive and beautiful resorts. On the South side of the estuary of the Canning are Como and King Bridge, then come Applecross and Point Walter. In long summer these are crowded with visitors, and at each is a beautiful beach. The Northern bank is equally well filled with holiday resorts, which attract their full quota of visitors. Crawley, which is reached by tram, possesses the most famous swimming baths in Australia, and farther along is Nedlands, with a splendid river beach. Claremont, Peppermint Grove, Mosman's Bay follow. Everywhere, indeed, along both sides of the river from Perth to Fremantle, there are beauty spots which are constant lures to residents and visitors alike. In short, the river is Perth's unique possession, which fact the citizens appreciate to the full, and on all occasions take advantage of the many amenities it offers for healthy and enjoyable recreation. The service extends to Nedlands and Claremont.

#### FREMANTLE.

If the port of Fremantle has not been so richly supplied with natural beauties as Perth, it has exclusive proprietorship in the ocean beaches on the coast line of the metropolitan area. North and South Beaches are thronged in the season by thousands of bathers and holiday makers. Every convenience for the comfort of those frequenting the beaches is provided. At South Beach (popularly known as "The Brighton of the West") an extensive sea wall protects a large area of lawns which kiosks and resthouses have been erected. A very modern hydroplane has also been completed, which is replete with modern conveniences, bathing boxes, refreshment stalls, rooms, and a large ballroom are amongst the comforts available at moderate cost. During the summer special one-day excursion trains from country towns, up to 10 miles distant, are run to South Beach, thus enabling country residents to secure a day at the seaside and a dip in the ocean. The electric tramway system of the port serves the District for miles around the town, and one line runs to the charming river resort—Point Walter. At this spot extensive

beautifully grassed recreation grounds are available. The beach is one of the best in the river, and tea-rooms, bathing sheds, etc., provide for the comfort of visitors. During the summer months Point Walter is the rendezvous of thousands of Fremantle and Perth residents. A visitor from the city may travel to Fremantle either by rail, river or road. Between the two places there are good roads, one on the North side running through Claremont and other pretty residential townships, and the other on the South side proceeding by South Perth and the Canning Bridge. In order justly to appreciate the delight of the Swan River a trip to the port by one of the steamers plying at regular intervals should be taken. Every bend in the river opens up a view that elicits admiration, and in passing through the wide and long reaches a stranger may easily imagine that he is voyaging on a lake instead of a river.

Fremantle has some very handsome buildings, and the busy Victoria Quay is well worth inspection. The two moles at the entrance of the river are massive constructions, and the whole harbour presents a fine example of engineering skill. At one time the river could be entered only by very small ships, but to-day the largest mail-steamers make use of it. There are some very pretty drives in the Fremantle vicinity through beautifully fertile country. Among the most interesting of these village centres are Bickton, Spearwood, Coogee, and Palmyra, and the Peel Estate. At the latter place large drainage works are being carried out, and thousands of acres of hitherto valueless lands are being brought under cultivation. This is one of the most important of the Government's closer settlement schemes, and is well worthy a visit. The Henderson Naval Base, where there is a very fine beach, is within easy distance of Fremantle.

The Secretary of the Fremantle Business Men's Association (Mr. A. J. Lea Holt, 33 Henry Street) will be pleased to afford any further information required.

#### PERTH TO BELLEVUE.

To the East of the Capital, and served by the Eastern Railway and by road, are the flourishing suburbs of Maylands and Bayswater. Both are largely residential. Still further East are Bassendean, Guildford, and Midland Junction. Guildford is one of the oldest towns in the State, and at one time was the centre from which teams started for the farming settlements beyond the Darling Range. In the neighbourhood of Guildford are many fine farms, orchards, and vineyards.

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The town itself is nicely laid out and contains a large number of beautiful residences. The main North road, through the Upper Swan and thence to Geraldton, commences at Guildford.

Midland Junction is a busy town, containing the big railway workshops belonging to the Government, and the headquarters of the Midland Railway Company. The town itself has not much that is of interest to holiday makers, but, from Guildford, it is a centre from which many delightful trips may be made. Bellevue, about two miles East of Midland Junction, is the terminal station of the Metropolitan service of railways. In its neighbourhood are many orchards and vineyards, and in recent years the increased areas placed under cultivation have been considerable.

**PERTH TO ARMADALE.**

South-West of Perth, along the railway line that variously passes through Bunbury, Busselton and Bridgetown, there is quite a

succession of townships having claims to attention. Just at the South side of the bridge that carries the railway over the Swan is the pleasant suburb of Rivervale; then comes Victoria Park, a large and rapidly growing suburb, and Carlisle, Welshpool, Queen's Park, Cannington, Kenwick, Maddington, Gosnells, Kelmscott, and Armadale. All of these are in attractive situations and much fruit is grown throughout the district. These townships can also be reached by road from Perth. From Kelmscott the road runs through the picturesque Roleystone Valley (referred to more fully under "The Near Ranges"), and from Armadale a beautiful drive through Bedfordale is available. From Armadale a Railway also runs direct to Fremantle, the distance, 20 miles, being only one mile further than the railway journey to Perth. Large areas along the route of the Armadale-Fremantle Railway are under intense culture, and these are being added to considerably each year.



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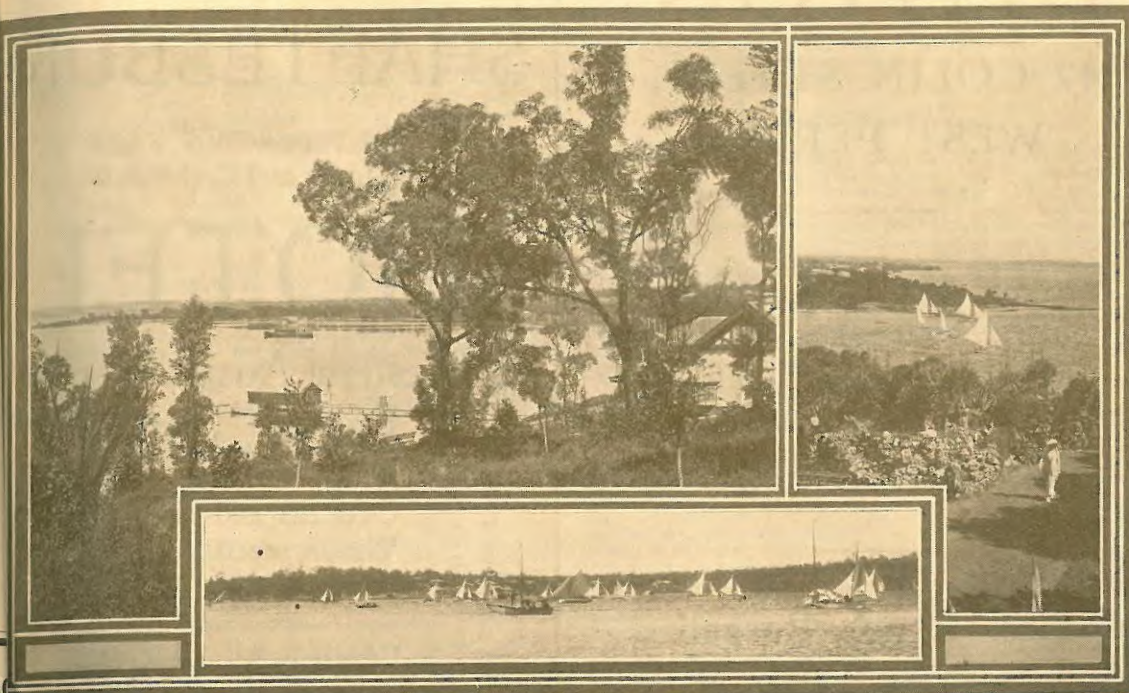
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## The North and North-West.

North of the Tropic of Capricorn lies that vast area of the State known as the North and North-West. It is a country of immense distances, watered by a number of fine rivers. Settlement, so far, has been limited, for the great majority of the people of the State have found in the South ample opportunity for the exercise of their energy and initiative. But the North is marvellously rich in many ways, although its resources have been developed only to a slight degree. Among the earliest gold-finds in the State were those in the Pilbara district of the North-West. But gold has been discovered in a number of places, and when conditions are favourable these deposits will without a doubt be

exploited. Coal has been found in various parts, and at Yampi Sound there are immense bodies of iron ore of the very highest quality. On the Coast the pearl-fisheries are among the most valuable in the world. The headquarters of the pearling industry is at Broome, from which port hundreds of up-to-date luggers work in the shallow waters off the coast. At Shark Bay, further South, pearling is also carried on, but the variety of shell raised there is small, and suitable only for such purposes as button-making. The shell found in the Northern fisheries is large, and is used for many decorative and ornamental purposes.

The North and North-West are the Divisions in which the big cattle and sheep stations are located. Some of the former have areas up to 3,000 square miles, and there are a number of sheep stations over 1,500 square miles in extent. Tropical agriculture is still in the experimental stage, but there is reason to believe that at no very distant date tropical products, including cotton, will be largely grown. The towns in the North and North-West are Carnarvon, at which a meat works has been erected; Denham, in Shark Bay; Onslow, where a deep water jetty has been erected in concrete; Cossack, once the most important coast-town, but now nearly deserted; Roebourne, the entrepot of a big pastoral district. Further north is Port Hedland, inland from which is Marble Bar, which has communication by rail with Port Hedland; Broome the centre of the pearl fisheries; and on the North, Derby, in King's Sound, and Wyndham, in Cambridge Gulf. At the last-named is a large meat works erected and worked by the Government. From most of the ports named cattle and sheep are shipped, more particularly from Derby and Wyndham. There is regular steam communication between Fremantle and all the ports mentioned.

Some of the finest scenery in the State is to be found in the mountain ranges and valleys of the far North, and during the winter season tourist parties are organised by the Government Tourist Bureau to Wyndham and Port Darwin, the latter port being in the Northern Territory.

The s.s. "Bambra" (State Shipping Service) is utilised for these tours, as that vessel calls at all ports both on the outward and return journeys. The ports of call are Geraldton, Shark Bay, Carnarvon, Onslow, Point Samson, Depuch Island (Bulla Bulla), Port Hedland, Broome, Derby, Wyndham, and Port Darwin. Special fares are arranged for these round tours, and it is intended to repeat the trips each winter in the future. No more interesting trip could be provided in Australia, and the saloon steamer fare of £25 for the round trip of 30 days defies comparison anywhere in Australia.

A special Department has been created to control this Territory—the North-West Department—with headquarters in the old Post Office Buildings, Perth. A Commissioner for the North-West resides in the Territory with headquarters at Broome. The Secretary of the Department (Mr. A. O. Neville) will be pleased to answer any inquiries.

Speedy and regular communication has now been established between Perth and North-West by means of aeroplanes controlled by the Western Australian Airways, Limited. The following particulars of this service are interesting:—

### AVIATION IN WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

There is in regular operation in Western Australia an aerial mail and passenger service linking up all the important ports on the north-west coast between Perth and Derby.

The Western Australian Airways, Limited, was formed in August, 1921, and carries out the Government mail contract embodying the flying of 2,900 miles per week between Perth and Derby, and return, calling at Geraldton, Carnarvon, Onslow, Roebourne, Whim Creek, Port Hedland and Broome. The majority of the flying has been carried out to schedule time, and the efficiency obtained has been commented upon from all quarters. Apart from the regular service to North-West ports, special trips are undertaken at short notice, one of which recently covered a distance of over three thousand miles. Many of these trips have been arranged for the conveyance of doctors and their patients to and from inland stations, where other forms of transport would be useless or impracticable, owing to the delay involved, and many fascinating stories can be told of the flights carried out by various machines in the fleet of nine aeroplanes owned by the Company.

The Company employs a large and highly skilled staff of expert ground engineers, who are licensed by the Controller of Civil Aviation, and are responsible for the maintenance of the machines in the department in which they are licensed. The machines are periodically inspected by representatives of the Government, and their certificates of airworthiness renewed. Machines actually built by the Company in Western Australia have already flown many thousands of miles on the mail route, and have proved equal to the original machines imported by the Company.

The Company's pilots have all seen service in the Royal Flying Corps or Australian Flying Corps, and are chosen for their all-round ability, and have proved themselves capable of dealing with all emergencies met with in the course of their duties.

During the greater portion of the year ideal flying conditions prevail all along the length of the route, but during the storm season from December to March, very severe conditions are liable to be met with, and storms, known locally as "willy-willys" (which prove a menace to shipping) burst and travel down the coast, causing great havoc in the track they follow. On these occasions the sky becomes very dark with winds of high velocity, making it practically impossible for an aeroplane to live, but before these disturbances arrive, a few days' warning is given by the rapid falling of the barometer, and the Company takes precautions by stopping the service, and securing its machines in their hangars until conditions again become reasonable.

The average speed maintained for the flying so far accomplished is between 80 and 85 miles per hour, but the machines are capable of a top speed of one hundred and ten miles per hour. Having an ample reserve of power, great satisfaction has resulted from the use of these machines, and interruptions to the service through mechanical troubles are practically unknown.

In the rapid transportation of urgent parcels the Company has rendered a service which is of immense benefit to residents in the North-West, and motor car and other machinery breakdowns, which would have entailed serious delays, discomfort and heavy loss, have been rectified by spare parts being sent by air in response to an urgent telegram. Quite a large number of business houses in the metropolitan area have now acquired the "aerial freight" habit, to the benefit of themselves and their clients.

The service is operated by relays of machines and pilots, and is carried out in three sections. The machines circulate round the route, and every three weeks reach their main depot at Perth, where they are subjected to a thorough examination and overhaul, and by this system the regular operation of the mail has been simplified. The Company is self-contained in practically every way, as the various members of its staff are capable of handling all the various problems that enter into the running of the service, and the maintenance and construction of the machines, and it is anticipated that with the development of both large and small machines, and the experience gained from the lengthy operations carried out in Western Australia, the Company will be in the unique position to handle aviation matters in the most up-to-date and reliable fashion over future years.

The fares from Perth are as follows:—Derby £28, Broome £27, Pt. Hedland £23, Carnarvon £15 10s., Geraldton £10. Excursion Fares—Broome-Derby, Return, £3 3s.; Perth-Geraldton, either way, £5. Subject to long distance passengers not requiring the seats.

The time-table on the mail route provides for departure from Perth at 6 a.m. every Thursday, returning to Perth at 4 p.m. every Tuesday, and practically the whole of the mileage flown, which now exceeds half a million miles, has been done in schedule time.

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The country traversed by the line falls naturally into four divisions:—

1. The granite plateau extending 167 miles Eastward from Kalgoorlie.
2. The limestone plain which runs for 450 miles to the East from the edge of the granite plateau.
3. The belt of sandhills on the Eastern edge of the limestone plain.
4. The stretch of country extending to almost 400 miles from Eastern edge of the sandhills to Port Augusta.

The Westernmost portion resembles the Eastern boundaries of Western Australia. The whole of the country through which the line passes in Western Australia, with the exception of the part around Zanthus, is taken up for pastoral purposes. There are many remarkable natural features in the big stretch of country through which the line passes, but at none of the stations has a traveller an opportunity of making an inspection of these. At Loongana, in Western Australia, are very fine caves, not yet fully opened out. Near Ooldea is a fine permanent soak of fresh water. At about 200 miles from Kalgoorlie, trees become scarce and stunted, and a little further on blue-bush and salt-bush form the main vegetation. Animal life is scarce along the route of the railway with the exception of rabbits, which are everywhere in evidence. Dingoes are there, and kangaroo and wallaby are found South of the line towards the coast. Bird life is fairly plentiful. The climate is almost uniformly good. In summer there are occasional hot days, such as are experienced in other parts of Australia, but the great proportion of them, even in mid-summer, are not by any means excessive. Throughout the winter months the air is light and clear.

The carriages are specially constructed for their purpose, and have every modern convenience that is essential to comfort on a long journey, including Dining and Sleeping Cars, as well as Smoking and Lounge Cars, and Drawing-room Cars for ladies.

The Trans-Australian trains connect at Kalgoorlie with the State railways.

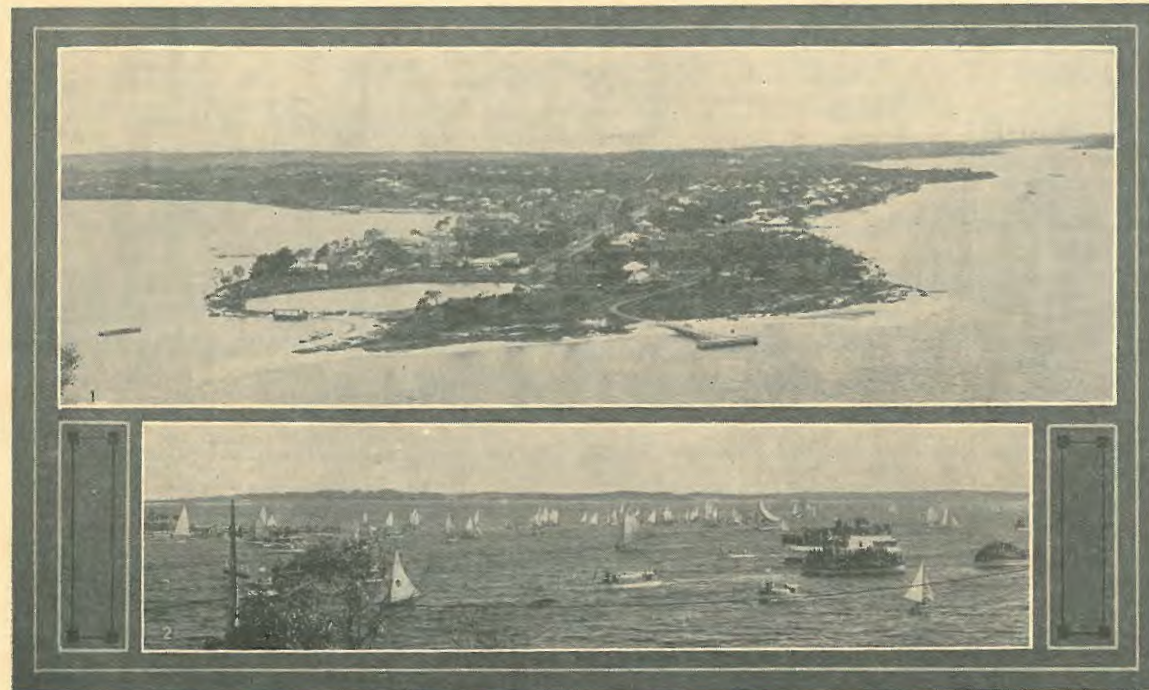

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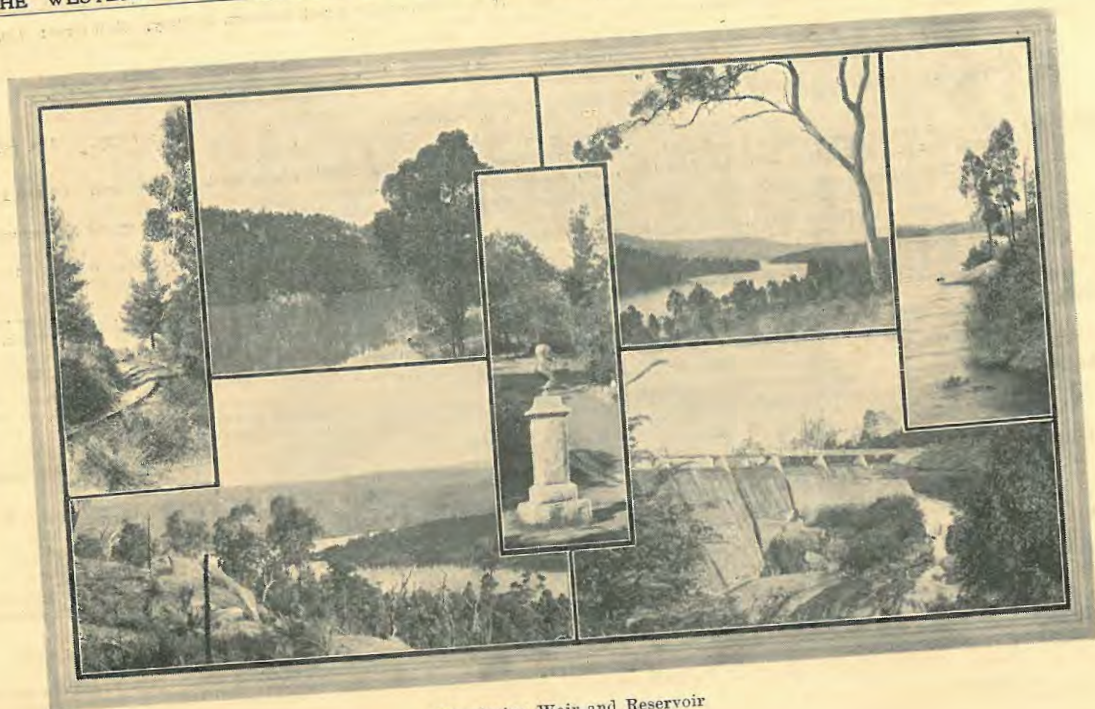

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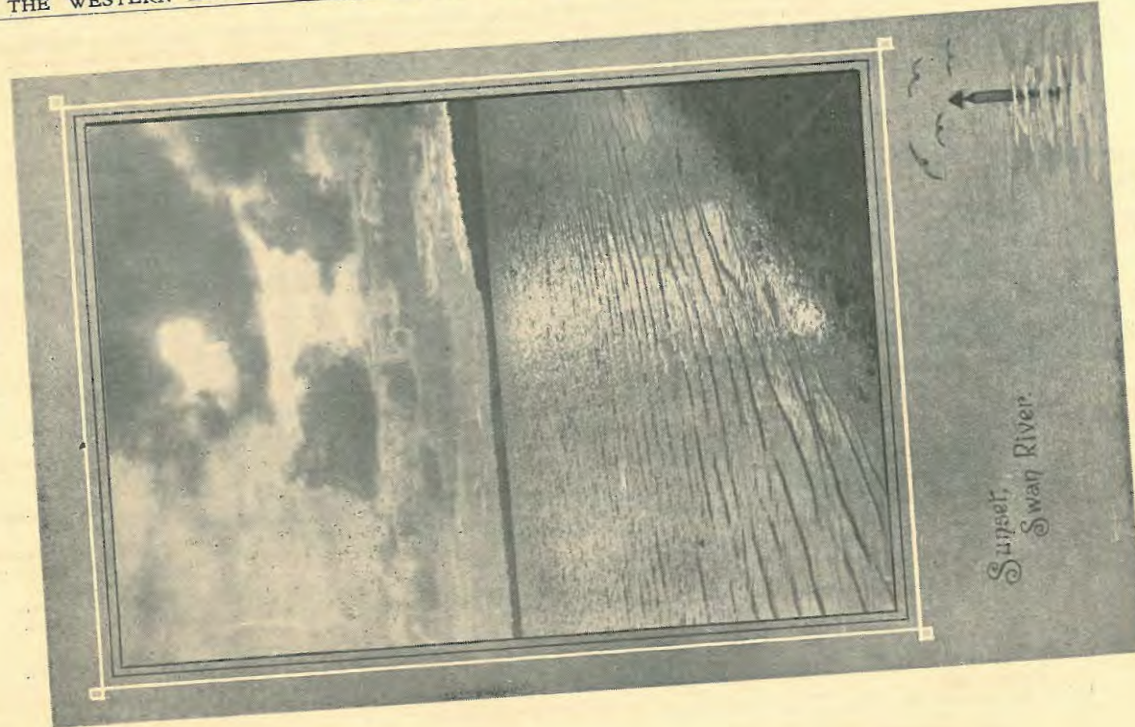
